3D Printer prepped for its January debut

After the initial printing of the red octopus pictured on page 7, the 3D printing process quickly became a struggle for the library IT department. In the last month, librarians Brian Chandler and Heather Campbell have successfully learned how to unclog the extruder nozzle, reinstall the plastic sheeting on the print bed, and operate the LulzBot software through a laptop. By overcoming challenges and calling the support line at Lulzbot in Boulder, the IT department has become well versed in tweaking the new technology. The main issue was trying to get the first layer of the printed object to stick to the heated bed so that the object would not move, and then the layers built correctly. In the end, an acetone solution layered onto the bed and a preprinting prep of maximum-hold hair spray solved the problem.

The entire library staff is now getting training on how to use the printer and how to help our patrons use it. Once staff training is complete, the Teen

Advisory Board (TAB) and the Idaho Springs librarians will be ready to share the printer with the community.


Library has lots of new and regular programs for our adult patrons!

From the Library Director

We've been busy at the library, trying to fix our aging buildings and modernize so we can give Clear Creek residents what they deserve — excellent library services that meet the needs of the modern world. Although we still have some landscaping issues to work out at Idaho Springs, where we are enhancing the yard to improve its use for our patrons during and after hours, our next big project is peeking over the horizon — renovating the John Tomay Memorial Library in Georgetown.

Right now, the Building Committee in Georgetown is going over a structural assessment paid for by a State Historical Fund grant and deciding what recommended changes and improvements are necessary to preserve the building and make sure we can grow with the community's needs. We are also balancing those recommendations with ideas from the community, such as adding a floor above the children's wing (the roof needs to be replaced for sure) and adding a Smart TV downstairs for movie nights and presentations.

One thing is for certain — although we want modern services, we also want to keep the character of our small town library intact. To be a part of this process, please contact Branch Librarian John Ewers.

We also plan to move some of the materials in the library down the street. We will soon move our District Office to the Old 1874 Schoolhouse in Georgetown, where we can open one room as an Archival Library to preserve and display materials that currently are being stored in boxes around the county. We do not intend to have regular hours for the new archives, but they will be available by appointment. This is a project which will take many years to complete, as we intend to rely primarily on grants and volunteers to set up the archives. In fact, we already received our first grant of \$2,500 from the Colorado Historical Records Advisory Board for materials to start processing contributions.

Another benefit of this move is that we will have access to the big performance room for library activities. We are hoping to move into the building as early as next July.

We are also trying to improve in other ways. For example, many of our employees recently attended the Colorado Association of Libraries conference to get some continuing education. And congratulations to Stephanie Mellon, who is just completing her degree in Library Science!

The printer will be available for use by all members of the public. A grand opening event to introduce the hardware and software is scheduled for 6 p.m. Friday, Jan. 16, at the Idaho Springs Library. Kids, teens and adults are welcome.

The TAB members raised money through a candy bar fundraiser and also secured grant

money in order to purchase the printer in October. There will be a flatrate fee per each object printed on the machine. The library will use the proceeds to upgrade the 3D

printer and replace the filament. We hope to experiment with a stretchy Ninja Flex filament, however, different extruders will need to be purchased for different filaments, such as Ninja Flex, wood and stone.

The TAB plans to fund-raise for additional technology tools in 2015. So far, music and video software and equipment have been discussed.



Library hopes to add maker-space with new and old technologies

The maker-space concept moves libraries into the 21st Century by allowing communities to tinker with technology. This collaboration helps to form social connections while learning new skills. Being able to produce products on a 3D printer within the library revolutionizes how people think about libraries. "A future in which libraries are noisy, messy innovation workshops is actually a return to form," says Tod Delgrove, a librarian at the University of Nevada, Reno. The ancient Library of Alexandria was home to the world's first steam engine, an early example of successful tinkering, he says.

In the coming years, the CCLD

plans to expand the library Makerspace beyond the 3D printer by adding pertinent software and hardware. Through collaboration, for example, the library could offer local musicians the opportunity, technology and space to record their music. We also envision teaching clothes. The goal of a district maker -space is to provide free education and access to tools otherwise too costly for individuals.

Even though there is not yet a specifically designated space to create DIY (Do It Yourself) projects in either library, innovation has already begun. Last winter, tweens

learned to film and edit mini movies on library iPads using the Idaho Springs Library meeting room as a home base. At the end of December. kids will sew basic circuits to make light-up Minecraft torch bookmarks during the Minecrafternoon program. Now, adults can join in on the fun too teens how to knit and sew their own and make a homemade wreath downstairs in the Georgetown Library.
